

Students at a glance

On Tuesday, September 4, faculty and staff members welcomed 77 new students to North Bennet Street School. After welcoming remarks and a presentation about the new building, the students met in their departments as a group for the first time. By Wednesday afternoon, joined by returning students, the atmosphere was lively and busy as students became absorbed in their work.

Generous financial contributions from NBSS alumni and other supporters makes it possible for the school to provide much needed scholarships to an increasing number of students. The total amount of NBSS scholarship funds available in the 2012-2013 fiscal year is \$200,000, up from \$150,000 last year. 39 students have been awarded scholarships as of August. In addition, 22 students received federal and state grants.

In good weather, Joe Cataldo and his friends sit on the stoop of North Bennet Street School smoking and talking. Students who come and go open the door gingerly so as not to hit them. In his 70s, Joe has been doing this for more than 60 years. He remembers Ernest Jacoby and John Dexter, who was loved by all the kids even though he wasn't Italian. He remembers playing as a young boy in Shaw House and he remembers sitting on the same steps as a kid in the 1950s, watching older men rolling dice, placing bets, running numbers. Every street corner had its regulars and this was his.

It would be jarring to tell Joe that it is not his stoop, that he can't sit there, or that smoking outside the school is not allowed, so no one does. It is clear that the stoop is as much his as ours. We are the newcomers, thinking we own the school, just the latest of many that Joe has seen come and go.

I did not appreciate what North Bennet Street School meant to the North End community until I began attending community meetings and acquired a public presence. Now that I am recognized, people greet me on the street and, when they do, they invariably express their support for the school and the move to North Street. As the project developed, and especially during the public bidding phase when no one knew what would happen, I received universal expressions of support. "Good luck, I hope NBSS gets it" was a common response.

Key to the success of the project is the confluence of needs between NBSS and the John Eliot K-8 School, the neighborhood public school. The current principal, Traci Walker Griffith, has been a transformational force at the Eliot School and a committed partner in establishing the alliance between our two schools. That Eliot School would acquire the current NBSS building to meet their expansion needs seems only fitting.

There are many aspects of this transition that seem more than coincidental. Eliot School students first came to 39 North Bennet Street in 1883 when students walked the half-block to NBSS for instruction in the manual arts. At the same time, according to city atlases, the new NBSS site on North Street was occupied by furniture makers. By the 1920s, NBSS had established a successful vocational training program for printers. During the depression, many of those graduates would find work at the Municipal Printing Plant when it opened on North Street in 1932.

We have no way of knowing why, after a surplus property disposition process that was so public it merited an editorial in the Boston Globe, the school was the only bidder for the North Street buildings. I like to think that it was because, in the same quiet way that Joe sits on our stoop, the neighborhood made it clear to all that North Bennet Street School was theirs and it wasn't going to be allowed to leave the North End. The solution to North Bennet Street School's future became a matter of neighborhood pride.

CITY COUNCIL VOTES TO RE-INVEST IN THE NORTH END

The land swap to exchange NBSS property on North Bennet Street with the city-owned property on North Street included a \$4,390,000 payment to the city in addition to the NBSS buildings.

In a sweet footnote to the transaction, a recent petition by Mayor Menino and unanimous vote of the City Council ensures that the \$4.3 million payment that NBSS made to the city will stay in the neighborhood and benefit the John Eliot K-8 School.

2012 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

ANEWHOME FOR NBSS

On February 14, 2012 the Board of Directors made one of the most significant decisions in North Bennet Street School's 131-year history—to sell the school's historic home at 39 North Bennet Street to the City of Boston and to purchase a larger facility from the city. The new site is the former Area A police station and the city printing plant on North Street, five blocks from the current location.

The availability of two adjacent buildings with a total of 60,000 square feet of industrial space in Boston's North End is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to build the expanded facility North Bennet Street School has long needed, while retaining its historic ties to the North End neighborhood. The facility will provide code-compliant and energy-efficient spaces for the school's training programs, the ability to expand public programs, and increased visibility in the city. For the first time in decades, the school will have space for the entire school to gather, enhancing the educational experience for students and strengthening the school's sense of community.

The possibility of relocating North Bennet Street School to the city-owned buildings was explored over a period of several years, culminating in a proposal from the North End community to use the existing NBSS facility to ease overcrowding at the nearby John Eliot K-8 School. With strong support from the North End neighborhood and Eliot School parents, formal feasibility studies and pre-capital campaign planning were completed in December 2011.

To complete the design phase and renovation of the North Street buildings, the school has embarked upon a \$15 million capital campaign.

On May 14, 2012, the City of Boston formally approved the sale of the properties at 152-174 North Street to North Bennet Street School for \$11,350,000, including the \$6,710,000 appraised value of the existing NBSS facility and a cash payment of \$4,640,000. The cash payment will be used by the City to offset the costs of renovating 39 North Bennet Street for the expansion of the Eliot School, a process that will start in September, 2013.

To complete the design phase and renovation of the North Street buildings, the school has embarked upon a \$15 million capital campaign. In order to accommodate the City's very tight schedule, NBSS must complete construction of the new school and move out of its current facility by August, 2013. This extremely ambitious schedule adds an additional sense of urgency to the fundraising efforts.

WHY A NEW BUILDING NOW

Since its founding, NBSS has been located at 39 North Bennet Street in Boston's North End. The current campus includes a main building and three adjoining townhouses.

For many years, the school has been hampered by the limitations of its facilities. While it has managed to consistently operate without budget deficits, pressure to keep tuition affordable has precluded meaningful operating surpluses to fund significant building improvements.

In 2007, a comprehensive study, resulting in a Strategic Business Plan, was undertaken to gain a better understanding of the school's financial future and its ability to solve its longstanding space needs. The study found that NBSS has been highly successful at fulfilling its mission to deliver high-quality training in craftsmanship and that significant opportunities exist to improve and expand its full-time and workshop programs. In its final finding, the study warned that "the existing facility is inadequate to support programmatic growth or enhancement." The Strategic Business Plan concluded that if the school is to maintain its reputation for excellence, it must develop an appropriate facility that both meets its present needs and will allow for future growth.

Beginning in September 2008, and working with real estate advisors from Colliers, Meredith and Grew, the school conducted a review of potential sites. While a number of facilities were studied and considered, it was not until 2010 and the availability of the surplus city property on North Street, that the school was presented with an ideal solution.

MIDDLE-SCHOOL STUDENTS ARRIVE AT NBSS

An important and integral part of the move to a new facility on North Street is the transfer of the buildings at 39 North Bennet Street to the City of Boston to be used to expand the successful and popular John Eliot K-8 School. NBSS and the John Eliot School have a long and meaningful history that started shortly after the school was founded in 1881 when students from the Eliot school came to NBSS for woodworking classes. Readers of Benchmarks know that that partnership was reestablished in 2010 when middle school students returned to NBSS for woodworking classes based on the original Sloyd method. The collaboration with the Eliot School expanded last year when NBSS relocated the locksmithing program to South Boston to make space available for two Eliot School classrooms. This September, NBSS bookbinding and violin making and repair programs moved to temporary spaces



on North Street and the vacated space on North Bennet Street became Eliot School middle-school classrooms.

While it's not easy having NBSS programs in four separate locations this year, the energy and excitement of the transition was made even more palpable with the arrival of 120 public school students.

How will it happen?

Designing, constructing and moving the school is a complex process and it is critical that the school operates fully during the transition. The process began with moving bookbinding and violin making and repair to temporary spaces in the former police station on North Street in September so that the Eliot School expansion into 39 North Bennet Street could begin. Final design and permitting for the new NBSS will be completed this fall and construction on the printing plant will begin in December. Moving the violin and bookbinding programs from their temporary locations and renovating the police station building are scheduled for next summer. It's an ambitious schedule that involves dozens of consultants, contractors, suppliers and, most

importantly, the participation of faculty members, staff members and students, and the generous support of donors.







years, Historic Boston and the North Bennet Street School have been working together to stabilize the structure and rehabilitate the most public facades of the house through the Handmade Houses partnership.

A BIT OF NBSS HISTORY

The distinctive characteristics of NBSS programs tend to focus both students' and instructors' attention on bench work and the teaching within the department. For years there was camaraderie among students within departments but few opportunities for students to get to know their peers from other departments. This changed when Mark Andersson came to NBSS in 1998 as the bookbinding instructor.

The tournament

Mark knew the school and the bookbinding shop well—he graduated in 1992 from the course led by Mark Esser and he had returned several times to teach one- or two-week workshops. In 1998, the bindery was in the basement and Mark knew that the location limited interaction with students in other departments. Mark decided to bring a table hockey board to the school as a way to encourage more social interaction and draw students to the basement.

In that first year, he posted signs around the school inviting students from all departments to participate in a tournament. In the first few years, the tournament was small and games were played in the basement hall. As news of the finals spread, more students participated and, as the years passed, Mark found bigger venues for the final game. With the raised profile, Mark sought "halftime" entertainment to ease the tension for the players between periods and to give a bit more flair to the occasion. He asked Walter McDonald. Associate Director and a well-known banjo player, to provide music.

In 2005, the event blossomed further when Mark asked a student to be the announcer, everyone sang the national anthem before the start of the game and, at the end of the anthem, the bookbinding students provided a fly-over by the "NBSS

paper airplane air force." In the same year, a student rigged a video camera and a monitor so that an overhead picture of the game could be watched on a "jumbotron."

The table hockey tournament continues to be a popular annual event, second in excitement only to graduation and the trophy is now the Andersson Cup. A good idea evolved through the years and became a gem. Mark was right when he thought that table hockey could bring students together.
