Jones, a free negro, and cabinet maker by trade, was arrested, and will undergo an examination on the charge of aiding the slave woman of J. G. Mathers to run away. It will be recollected that the woman was missing for some time, having been secreted by another free negro, but did not succeed in getting out of the city. She says that this man incited her to run away.
















Map of St. Stephen Parish, South Carolina c. 1773, Henry Mouzon. Duke University Libraries




